### **A Note From Pastor Mark**

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God. (Hebrews 12:1-2)

The football season is once again upon us. There's new excitement and hope among Browns fans that this will be the season that the team makes a breakthrough and goes deep into the postseason, if not the Super Bowl itself. Ohio State fans are enjoying hearing preseason predictions of a return to the college football playoff. Other colleges and high school teams will soon begin their 2021 season. Some high schools in Ohio have formed a league to play 8-man ball, making it easier for smaller schools to field a team.

That describes my high school football team in Hendricks, Minnesota, on which I played, although we played 9-man ball, with an extra player in the backfield. Those who came to the games cheered us on from the bleachers, the sidelines, and their cars which were parked facing the field around its perimeter. We weren't running a race, as the writer of Hebrews suggests, but our goal was very similar -- to take the football across the goal line and ultimately win the game. As we pursued that task, we were directed and inspired by our coaches.

The writer of the letter to the Hebrews uses the sports analogy to describe our life together as the body of Christ. In that life as Christ's body in the world, we are being cheered on from the heavenly bleachers by those who have gone on before us, and we are encouraged to look to our supreme coach, Jesus Christ, who, through his own suffering and death on the cross, showed us how to live lives of sacrifice and servanthood. We are also given direction by many assistant coaches, that take the form of parents, Christian friends and family members, pastors, teachers, and lay leaders in our congregations.

Since the beginning of June, I have had the privilege of serving as one of our Lord's assistant coaches here at Grace. In an article in the July issue of Grace and Truth, I outlined the process that I expect we will follow as together we work towards the call of your next pastor. This person will become your new coach, leading team Grace into new and ever more faithful ways of being the body of Christ in Fremont and the surrounding area.

So, yes, this will represent more changes for Grace, a congregation that has weathered much change since the disruptions to congregation life and practice due to a pandemic and the retirement of Pastor Jody last November. In January, LIFT welcomed Pastor Paul to serve this unique collaboration of Lutheran congregations in Fremont as its new coach, a ministry that we are happy to cheer on, joined by saints who are a part of the great cloud of witnesses described by the writer of the letter to the Hebrews.

But even though we experience change, other things don't change. The same writer of the letter to the Hebrews reminds us in the next chapter of his letter that Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever. I wish all of you God's richest blessings as you, both individually and corporately, continue to run with perseverance the race that is set before you, looking to Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith.

#### Sunday, October 10, 2021 Grace Dining Room 11:00 am - 1:00 pm


The Grace Transition Team invites you to an event that will encourage us to remember and draw meaning from our congregation's history. We will have fun remembering and recording important events in the history of Grace.

#### CONGREGATIONAL VITALITY SURVEY

Attendance and Offering have often been used as measures of how vital a congregation is. But are there other factors that should be considered in arriving at this conclusion?

Beginning in 2009, the ELCA Research and Evaluation department began work to develop a simple, statistically reliable, and valid survey that looks at the outcomes of congregational ministry in terms of how it connects with God, each other, and the world. The resulting scores help congregations better understand themselves so that specific areas of ministry can be addressed. Although helpful for any congregation in any stage of its life, it can be especially helpful for a congregation in the call process.

This "Congregational Vitality Survey" takes just a few minutes to complete, as it has only fifteen items that ask the questions "How well do these phrases describe your congregation?" and "How well does your congregation do the following?" which are answered with a number from 1-5, with "1" meaning "Hardly at all" or "Poorly," to "5" meaning "Very well" or "Great." What is Congregational Vitality? The survey website describes it like this:

It's about relationships with God, one another, and our neighbors. Vital congregations exude a certain kind of vibrancy, a friendly welcoming manner, and God's presence is tangible. Those who attend regularly have a sense of purpose. They support each other by nurturing one another's faith and helping each other identify their spiritual gifts and use those gifts in the congregation and in the world. When they disagree, they do so in a respectful manner, ultimately strengthening the congregation. The people in these vital congregations understand God's mission goes beyond their walls. They intentionally connect with the wider Christian community and within their local context to share the good news in word and deed by striving to be God's hands in the world.

PERSONAL CARE KITS: dark colored bath towels (52x27), bath size bar soap (in original wrapper), adult size toothbrush (In original package), wide tooth combs (No picks), metal nail clippers.

BABY CARE KITS: diaper pins or large safety pins, cloth diapers, gowns or sleepers (without feet), jackets, sweaters, or sweatshirts with hoods or include a baby cap (sizes 6-24mos.), socks, receiving blankets (cotton, flannel, light-weight crocheted or knitted), light-weight cotton t-shirts (No onesies), dark colored hand towels, gentle bath sized soap (in original wrapper)

## Sharing God's Bounty

#### **Sharing God's Love**

STITE

Share

s God's people, we are empowered by the Holy Spirit to follow Jesus' command to "Love [our] neighbor as [ourselves]" (Matthew 22:39). We can share God's love because he has first loved us (1 John 4:19). God is the source of love that we give to others. When we love others, God's love is made complete (1 John 4:17). Love is the distinguishing mark of God's followers.

It is both a privilege and a responsibility to share the love that God has given to us with others. In Romans 12:13 Paul wrote, "Share with God's people who are in



need. Practice hospitality." To the Galatians Paul wrote, "Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers" (Galatians 6:10).

The following two contrasting stories in Scripture help us see how love can make such a huge difference in our relationship with and our attitude toward people:

In the story of Cain and Abel, we see Cain's total disregard for his brother Abel. After Cain had killed Abel, the Lord said to Cain, "Where is your brother Abel?" Cain said, "Am I my brother's keeper" (Genesis 4:9). Cain was a man without faith and love. God's love did not dwell in Cain, and it showed in his actions. Cain also showed his lack of love for God by giving an inferior gift.

In the Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37), God's Word gives us an example of how we are to share our love with others. Traveling on the road to Jericho, the Good Samaritan found a man who had been beaten and robbed. The Good Samaritan stopped and attended to the injured person. After he had bandaged his wounds, he took him to an inn where he paid for his room and care. The Samaritan sacrificed money, time, and possessions and risked his own health and safety for this wounded stranger. By putting no limits on how far he was willing to go to help this man, the Samaritan demonstrated the love we should have for others.

As God's people filled with his love, we will be compelled to do acts of love for others. "For Christ's love compels us, because we are convinced that one died for all, and therefore all died. And he died for all, that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him who died for them and was raised again" (2 Corinthians 5:14-15). Motivated by Christ's love and empowered by his Spirit, we will be eager to share God's love with others as we perform acts of service.

God has given us many gifts and calls us to use those gifts to build up his kingdom. Our faith identifies us as stewards and gives us a relationship with God. Many of these gifts are given for our needs; others are given for the needs of others. Stewardship is a ministry by which we nurture and share our gifts.
