Minutes September 13, 2021

- Transition Team Update - will host six Small Group Meetings - 4 in-person, and 2 virtual via Zoom - throughout the month of October - to obtain input from members on their thoughts, feelings, and vision for Grace.
- Payroll Protection Plan #2 - loan forgiveness has been received.
- September has begun the startup of Noah's Ark Preschool, Wednesday Night Spirit, and Rally Day.
- LIFT Community Block Party—rescheduled for Sunday, October 24, 2-5pm
- Budget planning for 2022 has begun. Committee worksheets due by October 11, 2021.
- Christian Missions/Outreach committee will meet in October.
- Noisy Offering collected for September totaled \$240.35. Third and fourth quarter collections will go to Soup Kitchen.
- Christian Worship Committee meets on a regular basis and is actively taking part in worship planning.
- Christian Property Committee - overgrown trees in front of church were removed, allowing ease of access for Midwest Maintenance to complete exterior maintenance; grass will be planted in courtyard, looking at bids for parking lot sealing/stripping.
- Christian Stewardship Committee - participating in a series of Zoom sessions entitled "Building a Culture of Generosity"
- Christian Youth/Growth - 5th Quarter for middle/high school youth is held at St. John's after Fremont Ross home football games. Lock-in went well with 10 youth and 5 adult volunteers. Nine children received their First Bibles during 10:00 worship on September 12.

NEWS FROM THE ARK!

Noah's Ark Preschool began the 2021/22 school year on September 7 & 8. The Tuesday/Thursday class for 3 year olds is a class of 4 children. The Monday-Wednesday-Friday class for 4/5 year-olds has 11 students. The first two weeks have gone very well - working on understanding how school works, how to follow the classroom schedule, and getting to know the teachers and classmates. Students are learning their names and the correct order the letters go in! Mrs. Hirt and Mrs. Sawdo have so many more fun things planned and are looking forward to an exciting year with these students!

A Note From Pastor Mark

I have heard the claim that all of us have inside of us what is called a “Master Story.” It’s a story that you carry around inside yourself. It’s a story that tells you how life is supposed to work. Your master story will determine how you see the world, what meaning you attach to life, and your values. It particularly guides your moral decisions. It’s good to be aware of what your master story is. But the thing is, most people carry around master stories within themselves with absolutely no awareness of them. Our master stories come from our culture, often passed on from parents to children. We internalize these stories that shape our lives and they become so much a part of who we are that we may not even realize they’re there.

One very common master story in our culture is the rags-to-riches story of success. If we work hard, we can all achieve great things. In this story, poverty is a temporary state and there’s always the hope that things will get better for the deserving. Each person is given the same opportunity to succeed, based on his or her own merits. Another common master story is a lone, self-reliant hero, classically expressed in the American cowboy. This is a story that depicts simplistic, clear-cut confrontations between good and evil.

Faith groups have master stories that they share with others in their community. There seems to be a master story for Muslims that is about a faithful prophet who followed God’s will completely and was justly rewarded for that faithfulness. That’s what it means to be Muslim. For the Jews, there is a master story that is a story of redemption for God’s people; it’s the story of the exodus from Egypt to the promised land. Jews have internalized that story so that it clearly shapes their lives.

As Christians we have a master story, too. It is the story of the cross. At its most basic level, the church is a community formed around this master story. Our master story makes a difference in the way we live our lives as a community and as individuals within our community.

When we accept the cross as our master story, it shatters all competing stories as well as our lives. That’s something of what Paul was getting at when he wrote to the Philippians, “Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death — even death on a cross. — Philippians 2:5-8

This message of the cross has been faithfully proclaimed at Grace since 1892. The nine senior pastors and many assistants, visitation and lay pastors that have served you in this congregation have led members to see and understand the cross as their master story, a story which has guided their lives, empowered them in their serving, given them patience in suffering, and brought them to everlasting life.

The Grace Transition Team continues its task of gathering input from Grace members to incorporate into the Ministry Site Profile, the document that will describe Grace to potential candidates for your next senior pastor.

Eventually a Call Committee will be appointed which will review and interview a person who the congregation will call to be that next pastor. He or she will join all of Grace’s previous pastors in proclaiming Jesus Christ, and him crucified, and will lead you into a new chapter of Grace’s history of being a community formed around the master story of the cross.

Transition Team Plans Small Group Meetings

The Transition Team at Grace has been given the task of seeking and gathering the congregation's input as it plans to complete the Ministry Site Profile (MSP), the document that will describe Grace to potential pastoral candidates. The Team had earlier scheduled an event on Sunday, October 10, that would focus on the congregation's history, as reported in the October issue of Grace and Truth.

The Transition Team has changed their plans slightly to streamline the process for gathering the congregation's input, with the goal of completing the Ministry Site Profile by the end of November. This will pave the way for the eventual appointment of the Call Committee in early 2022.

During early October, the Transition Team will host six Small Group Meetings, four in-person, and two virtual via Zoom. The purpose of these meetings is for members to share their thoughts and feelings about Grace, and your hopes for future ministry at Grace. You are encouraged to choose the meeting time and format that best fits your schedule and plan to attend that meeting.

There is no need to pre-register for the in-person meetings (scheduled for the Dining Room) -- just come to the meeting at one of the days and times listed below. However, if you plan to attend one of the Zoom meeting options, you will need to register so that we can email you the link to join.

Congregational Vitality Survey Report

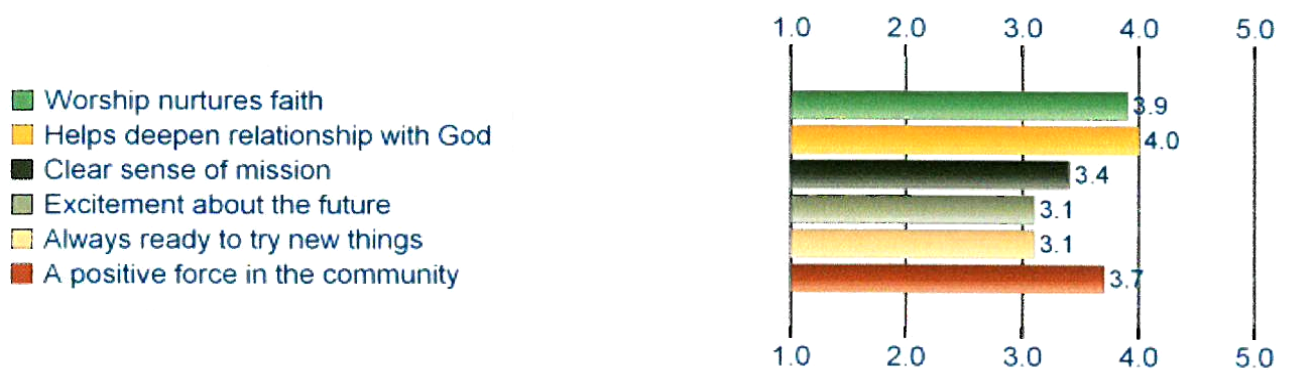

The results of the Congregational Vitality Survey that we have solicited responses to for the past month are in, and have been summarized in a full-color, bar graph filled, four-page report which you can view clicking [HERE](#), or by typing <https://bit.ly/394k66a> into the address bar of your browser. A hard copy of the report has been posted on the bulletin board in the Baker Street narthex and in the Dining Room.

A total of 58 responses were received, both online and entered from hard-copy surveys delivered to the church office or dropped in the survey boxes. Quoting from the intro to the report results:

This survey measured perceived strengths and challenges of the congregation in three critical areas: the congregation's connections with God, each other and the world. All items range from 1 (poor) to 5 (great).

Grace's average vitality score is 3.5. A target score is 4 or higher. This indicates that members of Grace have some concerns going forward. More interpretive information regarding Average Vitality Score is at the bottom of page 2 of the report.

Sharing God's Bounty

Living for Jesus

German Theologian Martin Luther said, "If someone would knock on my heart and ask, 'Who lives here?' I would say, 'Martin Luther once lived here, but he has moved out and Jesus has moved in.'" In Galatians 2:20 the apostle Paul wrote that he, too, lived for Jesus. "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God."

Who or what do you live for? If we live for ourselves and the things of the world, we will focus our attention and energy on amassing more and more things. It is easy for money and possessions to become overly important because our society tells us that more is better and that happiness and success can only be achieved by having the newest and best things. To find happiness and success, we work long and hard.

King Solomon, who was wealthy and wise, tried almost everything and found no satisfaction with things of the world. In Ecclesiastes, he tells us that he tried wine and women; he built houses, gardens, and parks; he bought slaves, herds and flocks, and amassed silver and gold. "I denied myself nothing my eyes desired; I refused my heart no pleasure . . . Yet when I surveyed all that my hands had done and what I had toiled to achieve, everything was meaningless, a chasing after the wind; nothing was gained under the sun." (Ecclesiastes 2:10-11). Regarding money, Solomon wrote, "Whoever loves money never has money enough; whoever loves wealth is never satisfied with his income. This too is meaningless" (vs. 5:10).

In closing the book of Ecclesiastes, Solomon wrote, "Now all has been heard; here is the conclusion of the matter: Fear God and keep his commandments, for this the whole duty of man. For God will bring every deed into judgment . . ." (Ecclesiastes 12:13-14). The only thing that finally gave Solomon's life purpose was living for God. Likewise, we as Christians understand that Jesus is the only person who can give us lasting peace, comfort, and security. He alone meets our needs. Jesus' tremendous sacrifice showed us his love for us and his love compels us to love him and live for him. Filled with Jesus' presence in our lives, we are empowered to overcome the pull of the world.

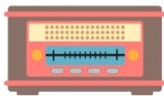
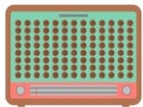
