

We recently received the following story from Grace member Annette Fisher, who describes the impact that SLAM has had on her life:

I have always been raised in the church and still remember my early Sunday School days at St. Mark's Church. My parents brought my brother and me here to Grace when we were elementary age, and it has been that influence of my parent's strong faith that began my journey. The journey that has only been strengthened through my times at SLAM. Insights into Bible stories from others in the group that I never thought of. In depth knowledge and explanations of what is still hard to comprehend but has built my faith beyond what I could have ever imagined.

The relationships that I have made during SLAM over the years have come to mean so much to me and I could not imagine being without them. We are there for each other through good times and bad. We have been through the births of children and grandchildren, trying times in our families, difficulties with jobs, and loss of friends and family members. With the assurance of my SLAM family during my own personal times of trials and tribulations I have made it through the valley and have come out the other side stronger in faith and able to be that shoulder for the next person that needs one.

Yes, it is Bible study but when circumstances in life outweigh the planned discussion, we take care of each other first and foremost. Knowing that I have such a strong network of friends supporting me, praying over me, and checking in on me when they know I am struggling has pulled me through some dark times. They have taught me that my faith walk is one that I do not have to walk alone.

I could never say that I attend SLAM on Wednesday nights solely so that I don't have to cook dinner for my family, which is true, but it has come to be so much more.

Wednesday nights are nights that I look forward to each week. It is time to be with my church family and build myself up for what the rest of the week has in store for me.

In case you are wondering, the meals are fantastic, so I hope to see you there!

A Note From Pastor Mark

Many of you know by now that my wife, Marcy, is a 5th grade teacher in the Norwalk Public Schools system. She teaches four sections of science, which means she has over 100 students that cycle through her classroom each school day. Over the past 23 years, Marcy has come to know thousands of young people and has hoped to teach them all to love science.

One of her students, Lilly, who was also one of my church kids, is now a college sophomore, in her second year of college, and has set medical school as a goal. Two of Marcy's students this year are children of previous 5th graders.

One of the interesting things about being married to a teacher is that you get some glimpses into the culture of families who gave birth to a child ten or eleven years ago. A part of that culture is the names that parents give their children. Some of the names are "different" because they reflect one of many ethnic identities other than Caucasian.

But some of the names are just plain "different." Or it may be a more common name but spelled in a different or unusual way. Marcy says that of her 100+ students, six of them are named Aiden, but spelled six different ways. A web search indicated over 25 different ways to spell that name. Another web search revealed the most popular names that parents are giving their babies today: Atley, Lively, Makenna, River.

I'm not suggesting that naming your baby is easy. For help, prospective parents often consult baby name books and websites which give the meanings of names and rate their popularity and uniqueness. Parents may also consider how the name sounds with the last name as well as a middle name, and whether or not the name they are thinking about will still be cool when the child enters middle school.

As we enter December and the season of Advent and move toward Christmas, three names that we will begin to hear often are Mary, Joseph, and Jesus.

The name Joseph comes from the Hebrew root Yosef, which means "He will add," or "God increases." This name aptly applies to both the Old Testament Joseph, who was sold into slavery in Egypt by his brothers, and Mary's fiancé Joseph, who allowed God to use him to advance God's purposes.

The name Mary is a bit more complicated. The Egyptian roots of the name suggest "beloved" or "cherished." But the Hebrew word *miryam*, from which Mary comes, means "rebellion." Good name for a two-year old, right? But both meanings apply well to Mary, who was cherished, a favored one, and a bit rebellious in that she said yes to being used by God.


Joseph and Mary didn't have to worry about searching the web for a name for their new baby. An angel came to Joseph, and said, "Call him Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins."

What can we learn from these names to help us in our life of faith? We need to be a little more like Joseph, allowing God to add to our lives by surrendering our will to his. We need to be little more like Mary and be stubborn in our determination to say yes to God's purpose for us over our own.

And we need to remember that Jesus saves us from our sin and offers us true freedom to live life to its fullest as his disciples.

Finally, as 2021 comes to a close, we can remember another name for Jesus, "Immanuel," which means God is with us. Which means we never travel alone. Which means we are always in the presence of God.

I wish all of you Immanuel's richest blessings during this most holy season.



CALL PROCESS UPDATE

Reported by Pastor Mark

In the November issue of Grace and Truth I reported that the Grace Transition Team will be completing and submitting the Ministry Site Profile (MSP) "in the coming weeks." The MSP is the document that explains Grace to potential candidates, one of whom will become your next Senior Pastor.

The Transition Team has worked very hard to not only gather information and input from members of Grace, but also to translate that information into an accurate description of Grace in the MSP. I am happy to report that the final draft of the MSP has been submitted to the Synod office.

A person called the Call Process Facilitator (CFP) then reviews the MSP, and sometimes asks the Transition Team to edit or clarify elements of the profile. Once the MSP is cleared by the CFP, it goes to Bishop Beaudoin for his approval. When a required written reference is received (Pr. Matt at St. John's will be doing this for Grace), the profile then goes "Live" on the ELCA website.

An ELCA pastor looking for a new call can go to the following web address: https://www.elca.org/Call-Process/Current-Openings and enter search criteria. In the section "Geographical Preference," selecting 6D Northwestern Ohio Synod will reveal 11 congregations in our synod whose profiles are listed. Once Grace's profile is added there will be 12. There are an additional 13 congregations in our synod that are in the Transition phase as Grace has been until now, and will also be seeking to call a pastor.

The Grace Call Committee will be appointed by Council at their December 13 meeting, choosing from the many excellent suggestions provided by Grace members through the nominating forms that were received last month.

Please continue to surround the Call Process with your prayers.

Sharing God's Bounty

Gold, Incense, and Myrrh . . . and a Message to All

ow much do babies appreciate the gifts they receive when they are born? Did Jesus, being the Son of God as well as the son of Mary, value the gifts the Magi brought? We would think those gifts impractical for a baby, but then this was not an ordinary baby. That gold bought food and lodging and everything that was needed by the holy family as they fled to Egypt and then got established in a new home. The incense was burned as their prayers ascended to the Father in Heaven, and the myrrh was used some thirty years later to anoint the body later of the Baby grown to be our Savior.



"The gifts are traditional gifts of the East," the Concordia Commentary on Matthew 2:11 tells us. We can be sure that these gifts were appreciated by our Lord, for St. Paul writes, "If the willingness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has, not according to what he does not have" (2 Corinthians 8:12).

Were the gifts of the shepherds that first Christmas night acceptable as well? What did the shepherds bring? The Bible does not record their bringing any gift at all – except, that is, the gift of their running to the stable with anticipation, the gift of their humble worship as their anticipation turned to realization, and the gift of their "spreadfing] the word concerning what had been told them" as they returned to their flocks, "glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen" (Luke 2:17, 20). It is obvious the willingness was there as the shepherds brought gifts according to what they had. Therefore, according to Scripture, their gifts were acceptable.

We, too, can be sure that our gifts are appreciated by our Lord – the gifts of our treasures – our gold and silver and the gifts of our praise and adoration as we witness to what we have heard and seen. Like the Magi and the shepherds, we are drawn to the manger bed. Like them, we kneel in awe and adoration. Like them, we use the gifts God gives us, wherever we are, wherever God places us, to "spread the word concerning what [has] been told [us]."

SNAP MINISTRIES (Supporting Native African Pastors) We Have Completed Our Mission!

SNAP Ministries is a non-profit organization devoted to training and equipping men as pastors and ladies to minister in the church enabling them to plant true Bible-believing healthy churches that can one day be self-supporting and self-reproducing. We are a team of volunteers that joyfully work together with the team in Cameroon so that 100% of what is given benefits their work. Pastor Claude and our Cameroon and American teams sincerely thank you for all your help in developing this mission and contributing all the way to the end. God has been very active through it all as you can see by His many blessings.

What SNAP Ministries, Inc. was able to do in Cameroon with the help of other ministries contributing, many personal donations, and God's many blessings!

- 1. Support 5 main qualified pastors so they could continue their ministries.
- 2. Purchased 2 and ½ hectares of land for Pastor Claude's ministry. He has title to all the land. The main campus church is built on that property and Claude lives across the street. It will also be used for the training center. The pastors built 2 church buildings and set up 5 outside and inside churches in eastern Cameroon.
- 3. Tyndale Theological Seminary, out of Texas, gave material to teach students to become qualified pastors.
- 4. PROfac Bible Institute, out of Canada, set up a Bible Institute so both women and men could get undergraduate degrees in different ministries to help in the churches.
- 5. A well was dug to supply water to the property. Also there is a large pond for fishing.
- Ohio Amish men taught Pastor Claude to plant organic vegetables and fruit. They taught him
 how to build bee boxes for distributing honey. That has really grown into a great profit making
 venture.
- 7. Cocoa trees were planted which brought money into the ministry. Many supporters sent money for these trees.
- 8. American churches gave money to buy chickens, goats, and pigs to raise for eating and sale.
- 9. Special designated money was given for the education of the pastors' girls and boys.
- 10. Special designated money was given for illnesses of the pastors and their children and glasses for pastors and children who needed them.
- 11. Special designated money was given for a corn grinder and a chain saw which brings in extra money to the pastors. The corn grinder helped with food for their animals and for selling ground corn to other farmers. The chain saw cut down many trees and bushes to clear the land and can be rented to help others.

This could not have been done without the help of all of you. Both our teams have seen how God works and continue to be amazed!

Thank you so much for your continued support. 100% of your support benefits the ministry in Cameroon.


